Nouns

2a. A noun is a word or word group that is used to name a person, a place, a thing, or an idea.

PERSONS Robert Frost, sister, governor, Dr. Muñoz

PLACES classroom, Seattle, Carlsbad Caverns, store

THINGS tree, desk, Statue of Liberty

IDEAS honesty, envy, self-esteem, freedom

Did you notice that some nouns are made up of more than one word? A compound noun is a single noun made up of two or more words. The compound noun may be written as one word, as a hyphenated word, or as two or more words.

ONE WORD bookcase, basketball, hourglass

HYPHENATED WORD brother-in-law, great-uncle, warm-up

TWO WORDS lieutenant governor, Miami Beach, parking lot

Common Nouns and Proper Nouns

You may have noticed that some nouns are capitalized and others are not. A common noun names any one of a group of persons, places, things, or ideas. A common noun is generally not capitalized. A proper noun names a particular person, place, thing, or idea. A proper noun begins with a capital letter. Proper nouns are often made up of more than one word.

COMMON NOUNS poet, state, book, religion PROPER NOUNS Emily Dickinson, North Carolina, Number the Stars, Islam

To identify a proper noun, try placing a or an in front of the noun. If a or an does not make sense in front of the noun, the noun is probably a proper noun. For example, a Mount Rushmore doesn't make sense. Therefore, Mount Rushmore is a proper noun.
